Ninth Grade Geology Trip

On Sunday, September 22nd the 9th grade class gathered in the high school parking lot. We carefully packed our gear while an appointed group went to a prearranged location on campus to gather some wild, Charlotte clay. Our group then set off south, stopping to visit a small cave before setting up our tents near Mount Equinox.

As we sat around the campfire that night, we shaped our clay as we discussed the significance of the planetary equinox, and listened to stories the class had written about the creation of various landforms. Before going to bed we tucked our clay creations into glowing coals and woke the next morning to see our work emerge from the ashes.

We panned for gold at Camp Plymouth but only came away with lustrous flakes and no nuggets! From the top of Mt. Ascutney we envisioned glaciers stretching across New England, and the next day, in the Ossipee

Mountains, we shifted perspectives to imagine the workings of magma and lava.

Several students tested their climbing skills on the pink granite of the Madison Boulder before we turned north into the White Mountains. There we hiked Mt. Willard to look back and see the glacially carved valley. Before leaving Crawford Notch, we hiked to Arethusa Falls and Frankenstein Cliffs.

On our last night we opened the geodes that the class received as gifts from the 10th grade. In returning to civilization on Friday afternoon, we stopped first for a warm welcome at Orchard Valley Waldorf School where we visited with the second grade and said goodbye to several in our party. Once again back to LCWHS, the class did a wonderful job cleaning the gear so that it is ready for the next group! This week's question: How do we compare with other Waldorf schools?

We are just like everyone else ... only more so.

Last year we participated in an informal survey of K-12 Waldorf schools, which looked at annual giving, sources of funds and staffing. My conclusion is that LCWS is just like everyone else ... only more so. An old business partner of mine used to say that certain comparisons were "apples to bricks" by which he meant that you couldn't really look at the things you were being asked to group and draw any useful conclusions. To some extent comparing LCWS to schools in other parts of the country risks an apples to bricks comparison. But here is what I see in the just like everyone else category:

- Philanthropy is alive and well in Waldorf schools across the country
- Their work is shepherded by professional development staffs with various backgrounds
- Most schools get most of their money through annual unrestricted giving but also rely on auctions, events and grants
- And, in the only "more so" category: based on enrollment size and local demographics, our school works out of a smaller population and economy but has comparable fundraising goals!

Against these reflections, I begin to really recognize the scope of what our Capital Campaign and Annual Giving Campaign say about the generosity of spirit, passion and commitment of so many parents, grandparents, friends and faculty members in our community. From the simply breathtaking gifts of foundations and individuals who are able, to gifts based on accumulating automatic payroll deductions: OUR COMMUNITY GIVES! 
